

How False Prophets Misuse the Old Covenant to Mislead on Generational Curses

5. Enforcing Old Testament Rituals

Some false prophets encourage believers to partake in rituals such as blood sacrifices, salt baths, or anointing oil purchases to break generational curses. However, the New Testament teaches that Christ's blood alone is sufficient for redemption (Hebrews 9:12-14).

6. Falsely Attributing Personal Struggles to Ancestral Curses

Instead of encouraging repentance and spiritual growth, false prophets blame failures, sickness, and poverty on ancestral curses. The Bible teaches that trials can be a test of faith (James 1:2-4) and not necessarily the result of a curse.

7. Exploiting Vulnerable People

8. Twisting the Concept of Spiritual Warfare

9. Creating a Culture of Spiritual Elitism
